2022 PhxMQG Block Lotto

May: Solstice Series: Bright Hope Star

Unfinished: 121/2"



The summer solstice occurs next month and for some it is a renewal or new beginning, full of hope. This beautiful star is cleverly uses the block, Bright Hope, as its center and involves no Y-seams. It also makes the Bright Hope block without a partial seam, but I recommend that if you don't already know how to do a partial seam, use this easy block to learn. The center of each star is perfect for embroidery or applique!



Fabrics to Cut:

Center block: 1: 41/8" x 41/8" Background - white or white-on-white

Full log pieces: 3: 51/8" x 11/2" Three different bright colors in prints or solids

Large partial log: 1: 41/8" x 11/2" Fourth bright color in print or solid Small partial log: 1: 11/2" x 11/2" Fourth bright color in print or solid

Star points: 4: 35%" x 35%" Four bright colors (solids or prints) can be the same or different

from the logs colors—cut on the diagonal to form 8 triangles

HST Background: 2: 35/6" x 35/6" Background - white or white-on-white—cut on the diagonal to form 4

triangles

Block corners: 4: 4½" x 4½" Background - white or white-on-white

Note: If you are doing a partial seam, cut 4 full log pieces and ignore the two partial log pieces. This is highly recommended if you are doing solid bright fabrics.

If you are doing a partial seam:

- 1. Align the first log with one edge of the center fabric
- 2. Sew from the aligned edges to the mid point of the center fabric and log.
- 3. Press seam allowance
- 4. Add the next log across the seamed edge of the center piece
- 5. Sew across the entire log
- 6. Add the next two logs as you did the second log
- 7. Complete the partially sewn seam.
